## Mark Twain, the World, and Me Following the Equator, Then and Now

**University Alabama Press** "Winner of the Elizabeth Agee Prize in American literary studies Susan K. This led to the imbueing of *Following the Equator* with the racial and cultural biases of the era. *Following the Equator* went on to be a success, virtually propelling him out of debt, but now contemporary scholars and readers are left to make sense of Twain's often inconsistent observations, to figure out how to situate Twain's legacy in a new era. 'Mark Twain, the World, and Me' aims to do just that. More than 100 years after Twain's journey, Susan K. Harris follows him through Australia, India, and South America, tracing the themes and issues present in *Following the Equator*, addressing them head on, and using them as an occasion for comparing his era to our own. Her account covers a variety of topics, such as the conundrum that Hinduism presented to Protestant Americans of the 19th century, the clash of civilizations between Australian Aborigines and white settlers, the environmental devastation brought on by settler eradication policies, and more"--*
